Annual General Meeting

The 2025 Leech Lake AGM took place over Zoom on Wednesday, June 18. Thirty-four members attended the Zoom meeting, and 38 members voted on our annual meeting motions.

Vice President Rob McGill reviewed highlights from the membership survey which was fielded in April 2025. There was good discussion on roads improvement, winter road maintenance, stewardship priorities, and dues.

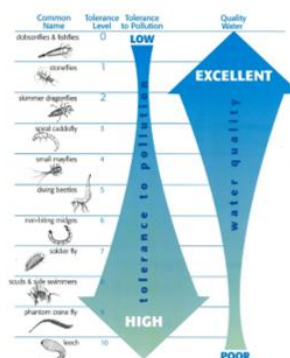
Shelley Bumstead, Treasurer, presented highlights of the association's financials. Our membership is slightly down from 2024, which is a concern. Our reserve (emergency) fund is being built back after being depleted in 2022/2023. Shelley is stepping down from the Treasurer role, and she emphasized the need for people to step up and volunteer for the LLCA executive.

Rob thanked Shelley for all her hard work and efforts in service to the organization.

Benthic Monitoring



Benthic Monitoring (Bug Count) July 21, 2024

- Organic pollution score (Hilsenhoff index value) indicated better water quality than the Muskoka average Vs 2023 where it was not as good
- Keep in mind results will differ with temp, site chosen etc. Looking for long term trends.
- We need undisturbed shoreline with silty bottom (vs. rock) not easy to find!
- Continue working on things we can control WRT to what gets in the lake & at what rate.
- Septics, chemicals we put in & around our property, limit run off & shoreline erosion encourage nature's filtration system

Leech Lake

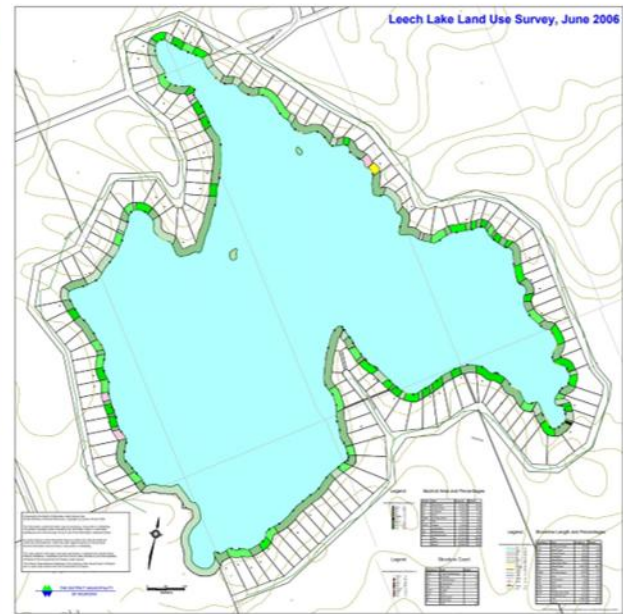
Location
Leech Lake is located in the geographic township of Collins east of the Stroudville town centre. Leech Lake can be accessed via Leech Lake Rd off Muskoka Rd 14 also known locally as Fraserburg Rd. Leech Lake flows into the South Branch of the Muskoka River.

Muskoka's Lake System health monitoring program includes tests for Secchi depth (a measure of water clarity), phosphorus concentrations (a measure of nutrient enrichment), dissolved oxygen and temperature.

Shoreline Land Use Maps
Shoreline Land Use Surveys collect data on shoreline vegetation, shoreline structures and the first 20 metres of land surrounding a waterbody. This information is then mapped and provided to lake associations, Area Municipalities and other interested parties for planning purposes.

we get over 11 residents signed up, because that will trigger their volume discount. We currently have 10 residents participating. Payment can be made by E-Transfer, Cash or Cheque directly to the provider.

You do not need to be onsite but you will need to ensure that your tanks covers are free and clear of tree parts, dirt, debris, grass etc. They will not pump out your tanks unless the covers are easily accessible.

There will be a few waves of pump outs taking place July-5th thru to July-14th. More info to follow.

Muskoka Lakes Association Executive Forum

Leech Lake Exec received an invitation to attend the Muskoka Lakes Association (MLA) Executive Forum on Sat June 21st. Valerie & Kasey McCoy attended the no cost ½-day session at the Muskoka Lumber Community Centre in Bracebridge on behalf of the LLCA.

Representatives from small and large associations joined including Horseshoe Lake, Brandy Lake, Stephen's Bay, 3 Mile Lake, Skeleton Lake, High Lake, Little Lake.

Topics & speakers included: Managing Muskoka's Watershed - Keynote Speaker - Kevin Trimble, Director and Past Chair, Muskoka Watershed Council

Breakout Sessions included:

- Advocating for Responsible Development- Steve Rohacek, Chair, MLA Government & Land Use Committee & Ken Pearce, MLA President
- Addressing the Impact of Boating, Dian Paquette, President, Safe Quiet Lakes, Director FOCA
- Monitoring & Managing Water Quality - Deb Martin-Downs, Chair, MLA Environment Committee; President FOCA

MLA has a comprehensive water sampling program that could provide LLCA valuable information at a low cost. Samples are collected and tested for Total Phosphorous, Water clarity, Total Coliforms, E Coli and in some cases Chloride (from road salt) and Harmful Blue Green Algae. ALS labs provides a volume discount for the testing and Hutchinson Environmental Services Ltd. analyzes the results and reports on trends. The consolidated report is published and available for MLA members.

MLA www.mla.on.ca has a comprehensive members-only section on its website and publishes impressive educational material.

The attendees had similar issues whether it be making things happen at the municipal level, maintaining private roads to trying to “preserve the view from the canoe”. Our Leech Lake swag caught the attention of a number of people and we were surprised to have a small line-up at our table. The experience in the room was impressive and networking opportunity valuable. The benefit of being part of this Association could be significant.

We have recommended LLCA pay the \$150 individual membership. www.mla.on.ca.

FYI -A rally is planned Sat Aug 9th to demonstrate against developers who have made appeals to the Ontario Land Tribunal regarding important policies / environmental safeguards in the Township of Muskoka Lakes Official Plan. At issue is the conditional sale by Infrastructure Ontario of 33 hectares of the former Muskoka Regional Center / Sanatorium.

Ticks in Muskoka – play it safe! – by Leslie Wood

Blacklegged ticks, which can carry Lyme disease, are present in Muskoka and other parts of Ontario. These ticks are becoming more common due to climate change and are active during warmer months, particularly in wooded and grassy areas. It's important to take precautions when outdoors to avoid tick bites and Lyme disease.

- **Ticks thrive in specific environments:** They are commonly found in wooded areas, tall grass, and overgrown grassy habitats. Ticks are often found in and near areas with trees, shrubs, grass, wood piles and piles of leaves. Ticks can also be found around your home. They can't survive for long in dry, sunny areas.
- **Lyme disease is a concern:** It is a bacterial infection transmitted through the bite of an infected blacklegged tick.
- **Early symptoms of Lyme disease:** May include fever, chills, headache, muscle and joint pain, fatigue, and a rash that expands from the bite site.
- **Severe symptoms can occur if left untreated:** These can include recurring arthritis, neurological problems, and heart disorders.
- **How to protect yourself from ticks:**
 - **Wear protective clothing:** Long-sleeved shirts and pants, closed-toe shoes, and light-coloured clothing are recommended to make ticks easier to spot.
 - **Tuck your pants into your socks and your shirt into your pants:** This helps prevent ticks from crawling under your clothing.
 - **Use insect repellent:** DEET or Icaridin-based repellents can help deter ticks.
 - **Stay on marked trails:** Avoid walking through tall grass and wooded areas where ticks are likely to be present.
 - **Check for ticks:** After spending time outdoors, thoroughly check yourself, your children, and your pets for ticks.
 - **Remove ticks promptly:** If you find a tick attached to your skin, remove it carefully with fine-tipped tweezers. Grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible, then pull it straight out with steady, even pressure. Avoid twisting or jerking the tick. After removal, clean the bite area and your hands with soap and water or rubbing alcohol.



Do not attempt to remove a tick by burning it, using petroleum jelly, or any other folk remedies. These methods can be ineffective and perhaps harmful.

Kill the tick before disposing of it by drowning it in rubbing alcohol or by freezing it for several days. Avoid squashing ticks with bare fingers as infection may enter through breaks in your skin, such as close to the fingernail. You can dispose of ticks in your household garbage once they're dead.

- **Shower soon after being outdoors:** This can help remove any loose ticks.

If you suspect you have Lyme disease:

- **Seek medical attention:** If you develop symptoms of Lyme disease, especially a rash that resembles a bullseye, consult a doctor for diagnosis and treatment.
- **Early treatment is crucial:** Antibiotics can effectively treat most cases of Lyme disease in the early stages.

You're the Bee's knees, but are your trees OK? – by Guy Pattison

Not sure if your **Pine** trees are healthy? Here are signs of problems: Pine cones with spots, brown needles, bugs, bark damage, the presence of fungi on the tree bark. Sawdust on trunk or base indicate bark beetle.

Not sure if your **Fir** trees are healthy? Here is what to look for: Yellow needles, early needle drop, bark abnormalities (peeling, or missing sections), dead or brittle branches, and the presence of decay at the base. Patches of missing bark can indicate a long-term problem as well as vertical cracks in the trunk indicate disease or decay.

Not sure if the **Birch** trees on your property are healthy? Here are some tell tale signs something is amiss. Look for sparse, drying or yellowing leaves. You may also see wilting and dying of foliage from the crown, or top of the tree. You may also notice D-shaped insect exit holes in the bark. Excess sap on tree trunk will be due to insect infestation. Once these symptoms are visible, the tree will continue to decline, even if treated.

Not sure if the **Maple** trees on your property are healthy? Leaves may turn yellow, brown, or black, often indicating a lack of nutrients or water. Leaves changing colour earlier than normal in the season can be a sign of stress. The bark on your tree may also experience large patches of missing or peeling / cracking bark: This can indicate damage, disease, or pest infestation, and may expose the tree to further harm. You may also have root damage if you have bare branches on one side of the tree.

Contact one of the many local arborists should you have tree issues, e.g, Davey Tree, Barlett Tree Services, Integrity Tree Care.
